

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES' LEADER REPORT

It doesn't seem possible that as I write this report, I would have been working at the church for just over 2 years. During that time there has been some really good times as my confidence is growing all the time and I learn something new every day, I'm not going to say there hasn't been some challenges whilst at WBC but I really feel God challenges me with things but I know this is a good thing and am so thankful that he has called me to work at Waterlooville Baptist church.

Part of my job I love the most is the fact I get to make **Relationships** with so many different people and families, Building relationships takes time and won't happen overnight, to make those relationships it involves going out in the community and reaching out to people, as Matthew 10:5-6 tells us, *Jesus* told the disciples how to witness or *reach out* to those within the community, This has happened from some of the mums from the Mums' Matter group, I regularly keep in touch with them and visit them in their homes when they need a bit of extra support, Also one family that comes to Mum's Matter now comes to church regularly, this wouldn't have happened if I hadn't have built a relationship with them in the first place, as well as a thanksgiving service for one of the babies from the group. Part of my job is to listen to them and try and help them in their every day struggles of life and be a support network for them, they know they can come and talk to me about anything and I will always try and help if I can, God teaches us to be good role models and this is what I like to think I am doing with all the families I come into contact with.

Leading on now to the groups I have been running in 2019

WBC Splat

This has been running since I started my job and we see regulars come each week, numbers vary each week and lately we have been a lot quieter, but it is a lovely group and am grateful to Simon and Ed for making it such an enjoyable group, the families that come love the fact I have two male helpers.

Mums Matter

I have already mentioned a bit about this group but, this really is a group where we have truly seen God at work, the mums love this group and value the time they can spend with each other, this group also all come to Messy church once a month and are now starting to ask questions about the church, which is where Table talk will start so this will allow the mums to talk freely about life situations and then we hope this will lead into a 10 week Alpha course and I am really pleased we will be running this group with Horndean Baptist Church. My thanks to Maureen, Sue and Pam who help with this group each week, it can be truly tough at times as some of the mums have lots to deal with, but together we make a good team and having God by our side makes it a lot easier.

Friday Rock

This group has been fantastic to run, the children we get each month are a real joy to be with and we have a lot of fun together, we see anything from 5-10 children most months, I always felt that was not enough children but actually I have realised that the numbers doesn't matter, in God's eyes we are reaching out to those children who are all unchurched and in my eyes that's all that matters, most months we will play games and then have a time of discussion, nothing too heavy due to the ages of children as most of them are 11, my thanks to Steve, Ed and Claire who help massively with this group.

Messy Church

I took over Messy Church late last year and since taking it over I have changed the layout of how it is run and it seems to work really well, I have also introduced a prep and prayer meeting the week before Messy Church, this seems to be working well and have had lots of support with prepping things and new ideas too.

My thanks to everyone who helps with Messy Church it is a real team effort and such a great outreach to the community, if you like the idea of helping then please come and see me and we can get DBS sorted asap, we always need lots of help and any help is always appreciated.

Some of the events I have run in 2019

We saw a very successful Easter craft morning which saw over 60+ children and parents attend, I do hope to do this again this year as it was a great outreach and we saw families come from all various areas, I see this as a positive as it's getting Waterlooville Baptist Church on the map and telling people we are there, my thanks to everyone who helped with this event.

Berewood Breakfast in Bethlehem

This was a fab morning of community and coming together as one, we enjoyed lots of bacon rolls, the choir singing and lots of crafts, it was a good turnout although a bit quieter than the previous year but this was due to a few other churches also doing something that day as well, this year I am moving the date so hope we won't clash with anything else, my thanks to all who helped with the morning.

Queens Inclosure Christmas concert

This year it was my job to do a talk at the end of the children's service, if I am honest I panicked a lot about doing this as knowing there would be over 200 children and parents, carers and grandparents in the sanctuary was nerve wracking, however I did it and truly believe God was with me that morning willing me on to do well, I had lots of positive feedback after even from a minister who had come to see the service, so the sleepless nights and worrying was totally worth it.

I regularly meet up with two children and family's leaders who are both in Portsmouth, it's really nice that we are able to do this and support each other with things.

I am also in regular contact with the regional minister and meet up regularly with the Rev Clare Hooper, it's such a blessing having the full support from her and others.

Plans for 2020

I have started a weekly coffee morning at Costa in Waterlooville, this is for anyone who would like to come and chat to me not just families, as I said earlier the reason I am doing this is because I want to reach out within the community, Costa now know who I am and what I am trying to achieve and the relationships that are being built just in one hour is incredible to see.

I will also be starting a monthly movie afternoon, my reason for starting this is because I would like to do more social things with you all, I would love you all to come and be part of it. Home Education group is another plan for this year and I hope to get this up and running by May, it is taking quite a bit of planning and putting certain things in place, if you would like to come onboard please do come and chat with me.

I am also keen to get Creative Hearts back up and running and trying to find space in my diary for when this will be possible.

Lastly I would just like to say thank you to each and every one of you for your prayers and support during my time of sickness, knowing you all cared meant such a lot to me, thankfully the operation was a success even if it took a while to be fixed, I am still having hand therapy but hopefully not for too much longer.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The year of 2019 saw a number of things happening which were both exciting and in some cases challenging.

Initially Jonathan Edwards our moderator worked with us at Church Meetings to help us explore the type of minister that we were looking for and also the ministry that person would perform. As we headed into the summer, we had a fairly good idea on this, and a church profile was produced which in September the church meeting ratified and from thereon in we were part of the settlement process. As has been explained at the Church Meeting a number of times, to protect ministers currently in churches most of this has to be done respecting the privacy of the ministers and therefore little can be shared but it was a joy that one person we felt we should introduce to the church we were able to be open with due to him openly having to move on after his contract of three years would expire. He preached in very early January and sadly felt called to another church, but it was an interesting part of the process. In 2020 we will continue to receive names and explore who God is calling to ministry at Waterlooville Baptist and at the right time I am sure God will call someone to the church and I am fully expecting that by the time we come to have the next annual report we will know who that is.

It was unfortunate that Amy Tamblyn had to have an extended period of time off from the summer until late autumn to have surgery on her hand and then recover from the surgery but as she returned to work in the autumn she quickly picked up where she had left off and as you can see from her report earlier there are many good activities happening. We all need to remember that the purpose of Amy's work is to build bridges and connections with the community and to engage with people through the various groups she runs. It is recognised that this takes time, but we are already starting to see a number of people come into the church through these connections and it is a joy for us to see this.

One of the discussions points we had had for some while was the Baptist Union Pension deficit and that we as a church had a part in this and would need to find some money to pay this off. Due to various circumstances happening there was an opportunity to do this for something around £10,000 and the church was asked through a gift day to help fund this. This was to avoid a cost of in excess of £40,000 so clearly a very good return on investment. The church very much rose to the challenge and not only did we have from the gift day enough money to pay this pension deficit off but also make a significant contribution to the fabric project particularly the fire alarm and emergency lighting system.

One of the major fabric activities we did was to work on the building to install a fire alarm system and also comprehensive emergency lighting throughout the building. This was one of the things that we were very pleased to able to get the support from the congregation in the form of the gift day and the final solution has been well received

Helen Wishart our church administrator handed in her notice over the summer and we thank her for all our hard work and commitment. Due to the church financial position we took the decision we did not wish to employ another person to do this and therefore her role was split up amongst various people in the church. I thank everybody who has taken on additional roles and responsibilities and particularly Elgan Evans who has done so much to help us in this matter.

As we look to the future and 2020 and reflect back on 2019 many good things have been achieved and this report details them but we also look forward to soon finding a minister and to continue our journey forward together reaching out to the community and the people that do not know the love of Jesus in Waterlooville.

2019 has been an exciting and progressive year for 1st Waterlooville with a lot of energy and 'firsts', either for individuals or for us as a company. We have also begun to re-establish elements of our programme that we have not been able to offer for a few years.

2019-20 session sees us celebrate our 60th anniversary. The parade in October was a great opportunity to have members young and old join us to reflect on and look forward to all the work that the BB has done here in Waterlooville. It was an honour to have Peter Reid join us and share with the congregation the beginnings of the company.

One of our objectives from last year was to grow, particularly the 5-11 year old age groups. Although our current numbers are fairly even, I'm delighted that in this area we have managed to achieve this and added 5 boys to Anchors and Juniors.

One addition to the activities this year was to offer a camp or residential for the boys again, as BB Camp has always been the highlight of a company's programme. It is a time where we get to get to know the boys the best and participate in different activities. 2019 gave us two camps to attend. Firstly, 7 boys and 3 staff, along with some girls from GB, attended Unite. Unite is a national camp held at the Boys' Brigade headquarters. The boys were able to enjoy a varied programme of sports, craft and worship for the long weekend with over 200 other BB and GB members. Then in September, 5 Company Section boys headed to the New Forest for an activity weekend camp at Tile Barn. This included Archery, Jacobs Ladder, problem solving, mountain biking and a night walk as well as all the camp related fun of campfires and BBQ's. This was a battalion camp with attendees from Portsmouth and Chichester.

We are heading to Unite again this year and we have also been invited to attend summer camp with the 8th Plymouth Company so hope to be spending a week in Perranporth, Cornwall in August.

Both BB and GB combined again in October to pack bags at Waitrose in Waterlooville, a great chance to show off our new banner and most importantly it gave us 2 new members who have settled in brilliantly. We raised a combined £330 which was split between BB and GB to help with activities and events.

Some of the other highlights of the calendar year include:

- Fort Purbrook activity morning
- Bowls at Waterlooville Bowls Club
- Go Karting at Eastleigh
- Visit from the BMS Action Team who worked in Kosovo
- Police & Fire Station Visits
- Family BBQ at Queen Elizabeth Country Park

We have 2 boys working towards their Queen's Badge, 2 Juniors progressing with their Gold award and try to recognise and celebrate the achievements of the individuals as often as possible.

We are laying the foundations to enable us to grow the number of boys that we are able to work with and reach out to, it is not a quick process but one that requires continual effort, reinvention and learning. I am thankfully to the continued support and commitment of the staff team who come every week. We have begun to raise awareness of our offering in the local community and aim to do this further with the distribution of leaflets to schools and continuing our social media and web presence.

FAIR TRADE STALL

It has been increasingly difficult to run the Fair Trade Stall over recent years. Our main supplier was Created and they ceased trading at the end of 2016, leaving us with only Traidcraft as a buying option who were also struggling in the current economic climate. Last year Traidcraft restructured their organisation and greatly reduced the range of goods they supply, while also changing the trading terms so that buyers have to spend at least £500 each year to retain their discount. This means that there is little leeway for out of date items or things that don't sell quickly, and in 2019 the Stall has run at a significant loss. It therefore seems that the time has come to stop trading. There was a final Sale period in January and February 2020 for remaining stock to be sold to cover the trading loss for 2019 and any items left after this were taken to the Salvation Army Charity Shop.

The summary of trading for the life of the Fair Trade Stall is as follows:
