

Secretary's Report

As we entered 2023, dare I say there was a feeling of optimism. Rev Sandra Platford had completed her first year with us in ministry, the pilot of the Community Café had been successful and the plan was this would now be a permanent part of the outreach in the life of the church. I had taken on the role of church secretary, following a time with no one in that role.

Unfortunately Rev Sandra became unwell in February and then following a repeat episode of COVID and already suffering from long COVID, even when her health was improving, was not able to work for more than four hours a day for the first half of the year, only able to preach occasionally during this time.

Following the service on July 23rd Rev Sandra and Bryan Platford met with Mike Davis and myself to inform us that she had been advised on health grounds that she needed to take a prolonged period of 6 months off work, in order to give her body the best chance of recovery.

An agreed statement was read to the church prior to the commencement of the service on the 30th July, explaining the situation. A whole range of emotions were apparent on the faces of the congregation: shock, surprise, disappointment. The fellowship prayed for Sandra and Bryan, for rest and for healing and that she might be able to come to terms with this enforced time of rest, away from the church. I was keen to not question why this had happened, but to emphasise that despite how it might feel God was, and is, still in control and followed an amazing service of praise and worship, led by Sandie Davis, which united the church in a way that to my joy, continued throughout the year.

Mike Davis and myself were drawn to the name of someone who God had placed on our hearts to support us in preaching at this time. Martin Mant rose to the challenge to support us, delivering sermon series in three or four week blocks through the year, providing continuity. I am extremely grateful to Martin for bringing God's word to us faithfully and it has been good to share worship with his family and adopt them into our church family.

With the support of the regional ministers, Rev Simon Gray supporting Rev Sandra and Rev Hayley Young, supporting me and the church, the four of us met regularly through the latter half of the year. It was apparent that there was no improvement in Sandra's health. In November Sandra was advised that she would need an even longer period off sick, maybe up to two years. At a meeting in November it was agreed that Sandra's ministry would end with the service on 31st December. This was led by Rev Hayley Young and we were able to give thanks to God for Sandra and her ministry with us. Sandra and Bryan were presented with a gift from the fellowship and we sought to bless her as she moves into the next chapter of her life, seeking healing and restoration.

I am thankful that Martin Mant agreed to continue to support us on Sundays and I am indebted to the other Ministers who open God's word to us on the intervening weeks. I also need to thank Sandie Davis and Annie Harding who plan and lead worship each week and the musicians who lead us in worshipping God. The preparation that goes in to each service is time consuming and a labour of love and much appreciated.

During the year five members resigned their membership. There were two baptisms which Rev Sandra was able to conduct and we welcomed three new members into our church family.

The process of becoming a Charitable Incorporated Organisation moves onwards very slowly. The new constitution was agreed by the church membership at a special church meeting, and proceeding to the next step is in the hands of the solicitors.

The youth work of the church continues to grow; Toddlers, Home Education Group and Boys Brigade all flourishing. This does not translate into families in church on a Sunday, but it is good that so many young people come onto church premises and receive Christian teaching. We hosted the QI Christmas service again and the church on that occasion Is full to capacity with children and their families.

As has been said in previous years the buildings are a blessing and a responsibility. Visitors are envious of our space, but the layout is not suitable for multiple groups meeting at the same time. The fabric of the building is tired and will need significant investment in the coming years. The deacons are therefore seeking a suitable architect to suggest ways of adapting our current premises to be more appropriate for our needs. The aim would be to embark on a project for a more adaptable building, more cost efficient to run, that can become a real hub for the community.

Through the year I have been indebted to my fellow deacons, particularly Mike Davis who as treasurer has enough to do without pointing me in the right direction. Sandie Davis, Anita Clement and I met regularly to look at the admin tasks that are necessary to keep the life of the church ticking over.

I am delighted that Sandie Davis, Karen Foster and Geoff Reilly were elected to serve on the diaconate from 2024. The church could not function without our treasurer, Mike Davis. We are all indebted to Steve Foster for the endless patience with us lesser mortals when it comes to finance and technology and the seemingly endless hours he puts in supporting Mike and the church.

I must pay tribute to the support, guidance, and care I, and the fellowship received from the Rev Hayley Young, one of our regional ministers. Last year was challenging. During the latter half of the year Hayley was always on the end of the phone when I needed advice or support. Without fail Hayley imparted wisdom and enabled me to see a way forward. I am grateful for her attendance at deacons and church meetings and her preaching, which cannot fail to inspire all who hear it. As a relatively small and aging fellowship, I feel we punch above our weight. That is due to all the leaders of groups who diligently serve, along with the teams that support them. There is so much that goes on behind the scenes: the cleaning, the gardening, the pastoral care team, those who arrange and distribute flowers, serve refreshments, and all the members of the fellowship continue to support and show love and kindness to one another.

As we said goodbye to Sandra and Bryan on the 31st December, we enter 2024 in a period of pastoral vacancy.

We are united in love for one another and for our heavenly Father. We come together to worship, praise, honour and serve Him, and we call on His name to guide us into the coming year.

We pray for listening ears and a spirit of discernment as we seek God's will for us as a fellowship of believers in Waterlooville

There are the more complex tasks, e.g. converting our governance to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO), safeguarding, finance and fabric and we are so grateful for a number of people who take on these tasks and ensure we comply with everything we need to as a church of our size.

Anita can be found in the office on Café day, but Sandie and Rachel mainly work remotely and we aim to keep church matters running. There are some things that take a little longer and when we appoint our new minister, there may be a need for more hours to be spent in the church office, but at the moment, we are treading water really quite effectively!

A huge thank you to anyone who supports the administration of the church in whatever way – you are truly appreciated.

The number of groups using our church premises during the week has grown, both church groups and external hirers of rooms who use our church building for community provision – not only does this make us a centre for community activity but it brings in income to support the work of the church. There may be challenges in hiring out church rooms, but this raises awareness of WBC in the community and supports our work. Our weekly diary includes sessions from Toddlers to The Steady and Strong exercise group and from home education provision to model car racing! Even our car park is used by other groups during the week; we aim to be open to our neighbours and hopefully this is a way to be a witness in the community.

We aim to keep our church members and friends informed about the work of the church through the monthly news, we are always on the look out for content and will promote any church activities, always making sure we keep your personal details private. The church office is a centre for dropping off information or random things found in the church – it may look a little messier than usual, but we do check regularly for additions.

Anita co-ordinates the stewarding team; this is such a valuable role as the stewards are often the first people who greet newcomers and support with directions to the toilet or the créche and handing out our visitor gift bags! We do thank all our stewards for their commitment. If you are thinking of volunteering as a steward or in any capacity in the church, we will help you find a role – just ask us and we can point you in the right direction.



The Leprosy Mission

The Leprosy Mission was founded in 1834, and is the oldest and largest group working to treat and support suffers from the disease and seek ways to eradicate it, and has the

aim of zero transmission by 2025. Leprosy is a mildly infectious, easily cured disease, but it can so easily lead to blindness and disability, if its symptoms are disregarded or not recognised, due to ignorance, fear or discrimination. T.L.M. is funded almost entirely by donations and very much relies on prayer, as it works, in many parts of the world, to see "leprosy defeated, lives transformed."

Life Groups

Embrace the Middle East Lent and Advent guides have proved useful prompts for study. One group chose to look at and identify the gifts of the Spirit which coincided with a sermon series on the Holy Spirit. It is incredible how new aspects and truths are discovered in familiar bible passages.

Whether new to the faith or a mature Christian you will be welcome to join a group to be encouraged and get to know others and study scripture more deeply.

Waterlooville Food Bank Donations

It is a difficult truth that poverty, and hunger exists in the UK today, however it is a growing reality. Many individuals and families in our local community struggle with day to day living and all it takes is a sudden unexpected event – illness, redundancy, a late pay cheque – to throw people into genuine crisis.

Food banks are community organisations that can help those who cannot afford the food they need.

Waterlooville Food Bank is in Wecock Church, Kite Close. PO8 9UX . It is open Mondays 09.30 – 11.30 and Friday 12 – 2pm where collections and donations can be made.

Food hampers are made up for those who are genuinely in need. You will need to be referred by someone who works within a recognised organisation such as Children's services, Social Worker, Housing association, CBA, or Church Minister. If you are already getting support or help with your finances from a front-line agency, you can ask them to refer you to the food bank. For those people wishing for a referral from Waterlooville Baptist Church the named person to contact is **Gill Phillips**.

You can get a referral for yourself and any family members you live with. Once a referral has been accepted and processed you will get a text or email notification letting you know when you can collect your hamper.

DONATIONS

All donations are welcome; large or small, regular, or one-off, they all help support local people in difficulties.

Easiest for small donations: Drop off your food/ toiletries donation at one of our collection points in the front and side entrances of the church.

Larger donations: If you have a larger donation of food/ toiletries, please give **Gill or Steve Phillips** a phone and we can arrange a collection.

WBC donations are delivered to the food bank on the first Friday of the month where the food is checked, sorted, and packed by a team of volunteers.

During the year 2023 – 2024 the giving to the food bank has increased especially with the Harvest and Christmas appeals. The giving has been truly generous and has helped stock the shelves at the food bank especially at difficult times during the year. Each month we are delighted that we still have more to collect; how amazing is that!

During 2023 Waterlooville Food Bank helped 180 families who struggled during the year.

Waterlooville Home Education Social Group

This group certainly lives up to its name! Each Wednesday morning, during term time, the Marshal Room, Owens Hall and, weather-permitting, patio area buzzes with activity and chatter, as the "Home Ed" group meet for fun, friendship, sharing (mostly amicable

122) and the using up of lots of energy. Most weeks, between twenty and thirty, sometimes more, meet up to have fun together and socialise. The majority of them are primary school aged children, although there are some younger and older ones too, all accompanied by at least one parent. Some come occasionally, whilst others are there almost every week.
